1. Newly Elected or Appointed Justices' Certification Course

The Office of Court Administration is offering an in-person Fall 2023 Taking the Bench Certification Course for newly elected, or appointed, Town and Village Justices. Taking the Bench is comprised of two separate training sessions, consisting of a five-day training, followed by a subsequent follow-up a few months later. The first session will be held at the Crowne Plaza Albany-The Desmond Hotel, 600 Albany Shaker Road, Albany, NY 12211, December 11-15, 2023. The second session will be held virtually on Microsoft Teams on June 20 & 21, 2024.

Each newly elected or appointed Town or Village Justice, who is not a member of the New York State Bar, is required pursuant to §17.2 of the Rules of the Chief Judge (22 NYCRR 17.2) to attend the first available Certification Course after his/her appointment or election. A non-lawyer Town or Village Justice may not assume the functions of the office until he or she has filed a certificate of completion of the Certification Course with their municipality (Uniform Justice Court Act §105). Attorney Justices are strongly encouraged to attend, and some Continuing Legal Education (CLE) credits may be available for attending attorney judges.

2. NYCOM Planning and Zoning Webinar

The NYS Conference of Mayors Planning and Zoning Webinar series continues Thursday, December 14, with *Pre-Existing Nonconforming Uses: Understanding Vested Rights & What Local Governments Can Do to Regulate Them*, from 11:00 a.m. - Noon.

Pre-existing nonconforming uses are extremely common in New York. However, most local governments have not proactively addressed them. This webinar will provide an overview of what a pre-existing nonconforming use is, why property



owners have vested rights in continuing those uses, and how such rights can be abandoned. Additionally, this session will address some of the steps local officials can take to phase out such uses and facilitate enforcement of nonconforming uses that are NOT prior existing to newly adopted land use regulations.

4. Preservation Assistance Grants for Smaller Institutions Available

The Division of Preservation and Access under the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) is now accepting applications for its Preservation Assistance Grants (PAG) for Smaller Institutions program.

The program is intended to help small and mid-sized organizations preserve and manage humanities collections and to secure their integrity and significance to a wide audience. Funded activities under PAG include preservation assessment, consultation with preservation and conservation professionals, source communities, and scholars; development or revision of plans, policies, and manuals; purchase of preservation supplies and equipment; purchase of environmental monitoring equipment; preparatory steps in the description of collections; education and training for staff in small and mid-sized organizations; and disaster planning and preparedness. However, conservation treatment and digitization are not fundable through this grant.

Local and county governments are eligible to apply, as are nonprofits (501©3 IRS status), and public and state-controlled institutions of higher education.

5. Companion Animal Projects Grants Due January 29

The NYS Department of Agriculture & Markets has two grant funding rounds available now through the Grants Gateway for capital projects necessary for the secure containment, health and adequate care of sheltered dogs and cats. For purposes of this program, a project may be a portion of a larger overall capital project. Eligible expenses include direct costs related to construction, renovation, rehabilitation, installation, acquisition, or expansion of buildings, equipment, or facilities. Applicants will need to provide a minimum of 10% of the total project costs. RFP0311 is for pounds, shelters, humane societies, or rescue facilities that are operated by or under contract with one or more municipalities for the provision of pound or shelter services. RFP0312 is for not-for-profit pounds, shelters, humane societies, or rescue facilities that are NOT under contract with one or more municipalities for the provision of pound or shelter services.

The deadline for both grant applications is January 29, 2024.

6. NOCCOG Executive Committee to Meet December 15

The NOCCOG directors are scheduled to meet on Thursday, December 14th, at 2pm at the Town of Trenton municipal offices. 7. Newly Elected Town Officials Training School


