

NYS Tug Hill MetroCount Program

Once again, the Tug Hill Commission is offering its MetroCount system to the municipalities in the Tug Hill region. The unit collects vehicle data for a section of road, providing insight into traffic flow and volume. The system is capable of producing detailed speed reports and monitoring vehicle traffic, including axle-based classifications, gap and headway, as well as direction.



Deployment and analysis of the

MetroCount roadside unit is available at no cost for any municipality. Commission staff will work with interested communities and set up the unit as directed. Data collection usually lasts about a week. The staff will then retrieve the unit, analyze the data and present a report to the municipality. Collected traffic data can be used to generate traffic summaries, histograms, and other filtered reports.

2024-2025 Records Management Grant

The New York State Archives has announced that they are now accepting applications for the 2024-2025 Local Government Records Management Improvement Fund (LGRMIF) grant cycle.

The LGRMIF grants help local governments to establish records management programs or develop new program components. It is a competitive program, awarding grants based on the merits of applications.

To apply for an LGRMIF grant, Records Management Officers (RMO) must have a NYS Directory Service (NYSDS) account prior to February 26, 2024. If a NYSDS account is needed, please complete the <u>online</u> registration form.

The 2024-2025 applications are due by March 11, 2024, at 5 p.m.

GPS Tracking Now Available on Oneida County Plow Trucks



The public can now track Oneida County Department of Public Works (OCDPW) vehicles through online GPS technology as they remove snow and ice from their road routes.

The technology allows residents to see when and where roads are being cleared and salted by county vehicles, which could assist in travel planning during the winter months.

OCDPW operates 28 vehicles that plow and salt over 400 total miles of state-owned roads. It also plows all the county roads in the Towns of Augusta and Florence. While OCDPW does not provide snow and ice removal for any municipal-owned roads in villages or towns, the county usually contracts with towns and villages to plow and salt most county roads within their municipalities. GPS tracking is only available on county-owned plows and the routes they are responsible for.

The GPS tracking map can be found on the county's website here. Tracking is initiated when the vehicle's salt spreaders are active. The map offers an address search function and allows residents to search by day and time. The live function of the map operates on a 10-minute delay.
