## Federal Aid 101 Webinar, April 23

Getting federal aid is only the first step in the process of completing a local project. To make a project successful, the local agency needs to understand the steps as well as the federal and state requirements.

On Tuesday, April 23, from 9:30am to 3:00pm, The NYS Department of Transportation and the Cornell Local Roads Program are sponsoring an online workshop, where David Orr, P.E. will walk through a federal aid project from start to finish, discuss the steps to a successful project, and review issues that have led to problems in the past. Attendees will learn the roles and responsibilities of the various parties involved and ways to reduce stress for themselves and the agencies overseeing the work. Discover the keys to success, navigate federal and state requirements with ease, and gain insights into common pitfalls.

There is no cost to attend the webinar, unless professional development hours (PDHs) are needed. 3.5 PDHs are available and require a \$20 registration fee. No partial credit for PDH will be given. The webinar format will be 4 one-hour blocks with two 15-minute breaks, and a 1-hour break for lunch.

## **NOCCOG Global Positioning System (GPS) Mapping Program**

GPS mapping services are offered to the municipalities of the Northern Oneida County Council of Governments (NOCCOG) at no charge. NOCCOG contracted employees will work with department heads or representatives to determine what data is to be collected and mapped. Collected information will then be provided digitally and can be updated at any time.

Public works departments routinely manage vital infrastructure equipment as well as items such as streets and roadways, parks, traffic signs and signals, street lighting locations, noting the maintenance, age, replacement schedules. GPS service enables municipalities to efficiently collect and store this information, manage, analyze, and deliver data on-demand for a streamlined workflow. This offers municipalities the ability to integrate this information, making their record keeping accurate and up to date.

## Kenneth V. and Jeannette Remp Sawyer Community Fund Accepting Grant Proposals for 2024



The Kenneth V. and Jeannette Remp Sawyer Community Fund, at the Northern New York Community Foundation, is accepting grant proposals from nonprofit organizations that serve Boonville, Constableville, and Westernville residents.

The fund was established in 2018 to support programs, projects and initiatives that broadly impact the quality of life in the three communities. The Northern New York Community Foundation administers this permanent, charitable legacy fund that makes annual grant awards. In 2023, 15 projects and organizations were awarded grant funding totaling \$52,100. This year, up to \$60,000 in grant funding is available.

To be eligible for Community Foundation grants, nonprofits must be classified as a 501(c)(3) organization by the IRS. Other entities may be eligible depending on the request.

The deadline to submit a proposal for consideration is 5pm Friday, April 19, 2023. Grant awards will be announced following the Community Foundation's quarterly board meeting in June.

Most grant applications are managed through the online Grant Lifecycle Manager (GLM) portal. Access to the GLM portal and creating a single user account for organizations can be found here.
