Kenneth V. and Jeannette Remp Sawyer Community Fund Accepting Grant Proposals for 2026

The Kenneth V. and Jeannette Remp Sawyer Community Fund, at the Northern New York Community Foundation, is accepting grant proposals from nonprofit organizations that serve Boonville, Constableville, and Westernville residents.

The fund was established in 2018 to support programs, projects and initiatives that broadly impact the quality of life in the three communities. The Northern New York Community Foundation administers this permanent, charitable legacy fund that makes annual grant awards. Up to \$60,000 in grant funding is available.



To be eligible for Community Foundation grants, nonprofits must be classified as a 501(c)(3) organization by the IRS. Other entities may be eligible depending on the request.

The deadline for submitting a proposal for consideration is 5:00 pm, April 24, 2026. Grant applications are managed through the online Grant Lifecycle Manager (GLM) portal.

EFC Grants Due May 15 and June 12

The NYS Environmental Facilities Corporation (EFC) has announced \$5.5 million in grant funding available through two programs to help communities protect and modernize water and wastewater infrastructure. Three million is available to help fund initial water quality capital project planning. This grant may fund up to 80% of eligible project costs up to a maximum of \$100,000 per project. Grant [applications](#) are due by 4:00 p.m. on June 12. Additionally, there is \$2,500,000 available to help protect water and wastewater systems from evolving cyber threats. This grant will cover up to \$50,000 for cybersecurity assessments and up to \$100,000 to implement cybersecurity upgrades. Grant [applications](#) are due by 5:00 p.m. on May 15

Kubota Hometown Proud Grant Program

Once again, Kubota is putting \$500,000 directly into local communities, awarding 10 grants of \$50,000 each, to nonprofit organizations with meaningful local projects. Each grant includes \$25,000 in cash and \$25,000 in Kubota equipment. Organizations must be located within 50 miles of an authorized Kubota dealer for hometown projects and initiatives.

USDOT Safe Streets for All (SS4A) Grant Webinar Series



The U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) will host informational webinars for the fiscal year 2026 (FY26) [Safe Streets and Roads for All \(SS4A\)](#) Grant opportunity. The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) established the SS4A competitive grant program with \$5 billion in appropriated funds over 5 years, 2022-2026. The SS4A program funds regional, local, and Tribal initiatives through grants to prevent roadway fatalities and serious injuries. Approximately \$1 billion is still available for the next funding round.

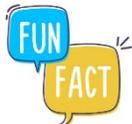
NOCCOG Global Positioning System (GPS) Mapping Program

GPS mapping services are offered to the municipalities of the Northern Oneida County Council of Governments (NOCCOG) at no charge. NOCCOG contracted employees will work with department heads or representatives to determine what data is to be collected and mapped. Collected information will then be provided digitally and can be updated at any time.



Most departments routinely manage vital infrastructure equipment (culverts, signs, valves) and other non-vital items (park equipment,) noting the maintenance, age, and replacement schedules. GPS service enables municipalities to efficiently collect and store this information, manage, analyze, and deliver data on demand for a streamlined workflow. This offers municipalities the ability to integrate this information, making their record keeping accurate and up to date.

NYS Tug Commission Hill MetroCount Program



Once again, the Tug Hill Commission is offering its MetroCount system to the municipalities in the Tug Hill region. The unit collects vehicle data for a section of road, providing insight into traffic flow and volume. The system can produce detailed speed reports and monitoring vehicle traffic, including axle-based classifications, gap and headway, as well as direction.

Deployment and analysis of the MetroCount roadside unit is available at no cost for any municipality. Commission staff will work with interested communities and set up the unit as directed. Data collection usually lasts about a week. The staff will then retrieve the unit, analyze the data and present a report to the municipality. Collected traffic data can be used to generate traffic summaries, histograms, and other filtered reports.
